Good Food Box delivers its 50,000th bag of produce

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Somewhere among the bags of fresh fruit and vegetables is a ticket.

It's not a golden ticket, per se, but it will entitle the holder to the richness of fresh produce.

On Wednesday, after 12 years in operation, the Georgian Good Food Box packed up its 50,000th bag of produce.

"To me it's another bag, another bag after another bag," volunteer Michael Kacmar said with a laugh as he worked his way through the 280-plus bags containing apples, carrots, turnips, and other produce. "I've been doing this for so many years it's just, 'I've tied that many?""

Georgian Good Food Box founder and current director Mark Redmond said the person who receives the 50,000th bag will have something a little special in the newsletter that accompanies every Good Food Box – a coupon for a free box next month.

"Fifty-thousand is a huge number when you look at us doing 400

or so a month. Over 12 years, I'm a little blown away by the 50,000, but more blown away by the tonnage – 50,000 bags of potatoes works out to 500,000 lbs. of po-

tatoes," he said. "When you talk about it in terms of half-a-million, for the potatoes, the carrots, apples, and onions, that really blows me away."

GEORGIAN GOOD FOOD BOX BY THE NUMBERS

- Number of boxes over 12 years: 50,000-plus
- Pounds of potatoes: 500,000
- Numbers of boxes packed in February: 615 (287 in Collingwood, 176 in Stayner, 152 in Wasaga Beach)
- What's in the box: Leeks, rutabaga, potatoes, carrots, onions, apples, oranges, a turnip, cabbage, beets, and a large spaghetti squash

The Good Food Box program distributes high-quality produce once a month using an all-volunteer force to handle distribution and packing. The 'boxes' cost \$15

for a large, or \$10 for a medium.

The value of the produce in the large box is about \$25, or more.

The packing and distribution is also handled in donated space – in Collingwood, the organization packs at the Royal Canadian Legion, while the group operates out of St. Patrick's in Stayner, and the Lion's Den in Wasaga Beach. Most of the produce is local: the cabbage comes from Stayner, the apples are from Glen Huron, and the potatoes are grown in the Reddickville area.

Michelle Wright shows up every month to the legion to help out with the packing and delivering, and gets a box for herself.

"I love to give back to the community and donate my time," said Wright, who has two young children. "When they get old enough I'm going to bring them here so they understand what it means to give back and do things out of the good of your heart."

It's also a chance for her family to have access to fresh produce.

"It's a gift, and amazing that the community will come together," she said. "My kids love it - it's like Christmas morning every time I come home with it. They raid it as soon as I get in the door."

Cindy Wilson was in to pick up a box on behalf of her son, who is on a fixed income.

"I think it's good value and it's good for the community," she said, noting her son wouldn't otherwise have the same access to the fruits and vegetables if he had to buy them at a grocery store. "He's on a limited budget, he doesn't get a lot of stuff."

Redmond said it's people such as Wilson's son who make up about half the customer base, though at one time about 70 per cent of clients were seniors or families on a fixed income.

Today, a substantial number of clients are working families and professional business people - some of whom will buy two boxes, one for themselves, and one for the organization to donate to someone in need.

Redmond estimated about one out of every 30 boxes packed is donated.

"People know they can get quality stuff here without having to go search for it, and they know it's local," he said.

Redmond, a retired educator, stays involved because he believes he owes a debt to the greater community.

"The people of Ontario paid for my education, and when I graduated, they hired me to teach and coach and guide their kids in science fairs. And when I approached retirement, and I have a pension they paid into, it's only fair that since I've been given some support, that I turn around and give a bit back," he said. "I knew I was damn lucky.

"It's nothing for me to do a little bit - each of us here do a little bit. That's what I love about Collingwood – we have all these committees, and everybody puts in a little bit, and then it adds up. I'm making a difference with everybody else."
