nity Challenge kicks into high gear in Temiskaming Shores.

The challenge is a broad-based effort encouraging children to eat nutritiously and be physically active. The specific theme will change every nine months.

The city is one of 45 communities across Ontario selected to take part in the challenge.

It's getting \$375,000 from the Ontario Ministry of Heath and Long-Term Care to coordinate projects encouraging healthy lifestyles in kids, targeting newborns through 12-year-olds.

The municipality will be working with other organizations to help make Temiskaming Shores "a place where it is easy for our children to be active," said interim program manager Tammy Borgen-Flood.

The Healthy Kids Challenge formally kicked off October 14, as children from childcare centres in Temiskaming Shores clambered over a refurbished playground at the Algonquin beach park.

Mayor Carman Kidd is the initiative's local champion.

Combatting childhood obesity

TORONTO (Special) - Temiskaming Shores is one of 45 communities across the province selected to take up the Healthy Kids Challenge.

They have a common goal – promoting children's health through healthy eating and physical activity.

The Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care said both are factors in maintaining healthy weights in children.

It cites the following:

- Almost 30 per cent of Ontario children and youth are overweight or obese.
- · Childhood obesity is associated with an increased risk of chronic disease and premature death in adulthood.
- Children and youth who are overweight or obese are more likely to become obese adults.
- · Adult obesity is associated with increased risk of coronary artery disease, stroke, hypertension, breast and colon cancer, type 2 diabetes, gall bladder disease and osteoarthritis.
- Unhealthy weights can influence self-esteem, social inclusion and mental health in children and youth.

Background work for the project began last year.

Ms. Borgen-Flood said a steering committee will be conducting an assessment of local needs.

"This is going to help us determine how we are going to implement these programs correctly in our community. Who needs this the most? How are we going to get it there?"

Affordability or lack of transportation, for example, may be found to be hindering children from healthy eating or physical activity.

"We're trying to determine how we can use what we have to overcome those barriers, and what we need to overcome those barriers," she said.

The Healthy Kids challenge is modelled on a program in France, she said, where it's credited with helping to reduce childhood obesity by more than one-third in 12 years.

"The key to the success of that program was having the community behind it," she said.

She said the local steering committee welcomes more input from interested businesses, organizations and other parties.
