Lakers head into 'Showcase' on positive note

It was a bit of a roller-coaster ride for the Fort Frances Lakers last week.

After being embarrassed in back-to-back home games, first 7-1 by the Thief River Falls Norskies last Tuesday and then 7-3 at the hands of the Thunder Bay North Stars on Friday, the squad bounced back in a big way Saturday night.

The Lakers exacted some revenge on the SIJHL-leading Norskies with a 2-1 shootout victory at the Ralph Engelstad Arena.

Adam Withers scored in regulation time, then Jaedin Ness notched the lone goal in the shootout to lead the Lakers to just their 11th win of the season.

"We came out and played with a purpose, were focused, and wanted it," said Lakers' head coach and general manager Wayne Strachan.

"As a staff, we were very pleased [and] it was good to see," he added. "We could have easily rolled

over and gave up but we came to work for [a full] 60 minutes." Brett Akins was outstand-

ing between the pipes, finishing with 38 stops in one of his best starts of the season.

Strachan lauded the play of his key players over the Lakers'

recent stretch of games. "I think since moving Adam Withers to centre, his game has excelled," he enthused

"He has led us offensivewise since returning from [the Christmas] break.

"Ian Jarvis has scored some big goals for us lately, and Anthony Antonelli continues to improve his game and is playing strong defensively," Strachan added.

"Brett Akins played a great game Saturday. [He] was big, in position, and made key saves.

"Overall, everyone is contributing in some way and that is what you need to have success," he stressed.

Given how the week started for the Lakers, Saturday's outcome seemingly came from out of nowhere.

The first-place Norskies stormed out to an early fourgoal lead against the Lakers last Tuesday at the Ice For Kids Arena and never looked back.

Thief River Falls was all business in a dominant opening 14 minutes that saw the Lakers mostly running around in their own zone.

'Storybook ending' for Muskie boys

Home is where the heart is but it's also where redemption was found for the Muskie boys' curling rink.

Just over a year removed from failing to advance to the all-Ontarios, when they lost a heart-breaking four-end second tie-breaker against the Ham-marskjold Vikings (Thunder Bay) 3-2 at the NWOSSAA championships in Longlac, the black-and-gold redeemed themselves with a 6-3 win over Widdifield (North Bay) in the gold-medal game of the OF-ŠAA championships Saturday afternoon at the Fort Frances Curling Club.

"It seems sort of like the dream ending to our high school career," an elated Silver said following Saturday's golden win.

Silver, Vandenbrand, and Bazylewski all will be graduating this year and couldn't have capped off a memorable week any better. "Coming so close two years

ago, and then getting injured and not making it [to OFSAA] last year, and then coming back this year at home and being able to pull it off after losing our first game just feels like the perfect storybook ending,' Silver enthused.

Volleyball league still going strong

Heading up one of Fort Frances' longest-running sports leagues is no easy task but it's one Bev Cochrane is taking in stride.

After spending the past three years as vice-president of the Fort Frances Women's Volleyball League, she transitioned into her new role as president back in August.

Deterring offences aim of map

Spot something unusual the last time you were out enjoying the outdoors?

Notice someone not doing their part as a responsible resource user?

Now there's a way to helpby accessing a new online tool that aims to reduce and deter natural resource offences.

The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry is asking Ontarians to help solve natural resource violations through a new interactive, searchable map of unsolved cases.

The map can be found on the ministry's "Solve a Natu-ral Resource Case" webpage, which includes common natural resource violations, recent unsolved cases, and directions on how to report a violation or submit a tip.

The map provides details on specific cases, summaries of violations, and the dates and locations of offences.

"We're hoping that this new online map will help jog some memories, and that people will contact our conservation officers if they heard or saw anything, said Rick Ladouceur, director of the ministry's Enforcement Branch.

"Each tip, even one as simple as reporting a licence plate number or that a certain type of vehicle was seen in the area, can be the one that makes the difference between solving a case or not," he noted.

"We often send out news releases asking for the public's assistance with specific cases and this interactive map is another tool that gives Ontarians a chance to help protect our province's natural resources,' Ladouceur added.
