COVID TESTING CENTRE RUNNING AT CAPACITY

CENTRE RECEIVES ABOUT 50 CALLS A DAY, **COMPLETES UP TO 35** TESTS DAILY

The COVID-19 assessment centre in Parry Sound continues to operate at its maximum capac-ity of 25 to 35 tests done a day. Most of the centre's testing ca-pacity is taken up with ongoing bi-weekly surveillance of long-term care staff and pre-clearing visitors to care centres or pa-tients before a procedure at the hospital. Due to the Parry Sound cen-tre's testing limit, those who call infor an appointment are triaged

tre's testing limit, those who call in for an appointment are triaged for symptoms or known contact. "(A test) is a snapshot ... it's more important for people to monitor for symptoms and of course get tested if have symp-toms or confirmed known expo-sure, as in someone in the home,"

said nurse-practitioner and di-rector of primary care, Katie Hogue. A test is not recommended for those who have had limited to ex-posure someone who may be size, or those who have no symptoms but are merely curious.

"People are pretty under-standing with the education our standing with the education our staff are providing," said Hogue. "It's status quo for now but we are anticipating when schools and business reopened an uptick (in calls)." While the North Bay Parry

People are moving around the province with retail businesses, ottage rentals and restaurants welcoming customers back in side, so its not time to stop taking precautions such as wearing masks, keeping two metres apart and washing hands frequently, Hogue said. The province also remains in a state of emergency with require-ments to quarantine, self-isolate and limit social circles. Since opening in March, the assessment centre has done 1.975 tests. Everyone who had a posi-tive test is now clear of the virus. Within the Parry Sound Dis-trict, which covers an area from Parry Sound east to Powassan, the North Bay Parry Sound Dis-trict has reported 13 confirmed cases of COVID-19 since the pan-demic bega. There have also been four other to cases in Parry Sound reported by the health unit connected with a person's home address.

Schools in Parry Sound and Almaguin will reopen in Septem-

On July 30, the Ministry of Ed-On July 30, the Ministry or Ed-ucation announced its plans for getting students back into class-rooms in September for the first time since March break. Care-givers can choose to continue at-home learning. The plan is for full day, every-day learning, but with safety measures includes masks and cleaning. Students in Grades 4 to 12 must wear a mask while in-side, while they are suggested for kindergarten to Grade 3 stu-dents. Teachers must wear med-ical-grade masks. The Near North District School Board was looking at three reopening options to sub-mit for provincial approval by Aug. 4 to reopen: regular school
