Richardson gets first Flyer win

Tyler Richardson blocked 50 shots for his first Provincial Junior Hockey League goaltending victory as the Petrolia Flyers beat the Sharks, 4-2 in Wheatley.

Matt Hunt and Clay Dolbear led the Flyers with a goal and an assist each. Kyle Flamminio and Lucas Ross also scored for Petrolia.

It was Flamminio's first career PJHL goal.

A night later, the home team beat Wallaceburg, 6-1.

Jack Hackett scored twice for Petrolia. Dolbear added a goal and two assists. Chaska Thiel stopped 27 of 28 shots, losing his shutout bid with less than seven minutes to play in the game.

And through two periods on Sunday in Blenheim, it appeared the Flyers might complete a three-game sweep. Goals by Harly Jacklin-Allison, his first in the PJHL, and Helps gave Petrolia a 2-0 advantage, but the Blades scored three unanswered in the third period for a 3-2 victory.

Richardson took the goaltending loss, despite making 40 saves.

HOW TO STAY IN THE GAME PART 1 PRE GAME STRETCHES

HAMSTRING STRETCH Lay on back & bend one knee towards the ceiling. Hold the back of the thigh with both hands & straighten the knee as much as you can by raising your foot towards the ceiling. Hold the stretch for one second, then bend the knee and straighten again. Repeat 20 times on each side. *Watch for Part 2*

GROIN STRETCH Stand with feet slightly wider apart than shoulders. Bend knees. Shift weight to the right leg. Reach down and across the body with left hand to touch right foot. Point right hand up to the ceiling. Keep back parallel to the ground. Shift weight to the left leg. Repeat 10 times on each side.

HIP FLEXOR STRETCH Stand with feet shoulder width apart. Step forward with right foot into a lunge position. Right knee should be directly over the toes of your right foot. Keep left leg and back straight. Extend arms straight in front and bring palms together. Turn upper torso to the right, keeping pelvis and hips stationary. Hold for one second and repeat 10 times on each side.

Petrolia's Leighton hangs up his skates

After nearly two decades in professional hockey, Michael Leighton is calling it a career.

The one-time member of the Petrolia Jets announced his retirement Monday.

The 38-year-old was originally drafted by the Chicago Blackhawks in 1999 after playing junior hockey with the Windsor Spitfires. He went on to play for 18 teams over his pro hockey journey.

His most recent action was with the Utica Comets of the American Hockey League last season. The Comets are the top farm club for the Vancouver Canucks.

Leighton had a career record in the NHL of 37-43-14 in 110 games with the Hawks, Carolina, Nashville and Philadelphia.

His best NHL season was

2009-10 when he won 16 regular season games for the Flyers and backstopped them to the Stanley Cup final where they lost in six games to Chicago.

He and the Flyers rebounded from a three-game deficit to beat Boston in the conference semi-final and he earned three shutouts to lead Philly over Montreal in the conference finals.

Leighton also played 13 sea-

sons in the American Hockey League. He is a five-time AHL all-star.

Leighton holds the American Hockey League record for career shutouts with 50.

When he returned to the NHL's Carolina Hurricanes in Nov. 2016, nhl.com quoted him as saying; "It's a long journey over your whole career. You've got to be thankful for every opportunity you get."

Former Petrolia Squires remember the glory days

Fifty years ago, a group of Petrolia boys decided their league team was good enough to play at a higher level. They didn't have any great expectations of a banner first season, but the Petrolia Squires - then known as the Tecumseh Chiefs - surprised the players and the whole league.

A handful of those original team members could be seen Friday night, standing together sharing stories at the beginning of the 50th anniversary season.

Terry Blackmore was part of the group that went to scope out the bigger league and says they weren't sure they were going to do very well. The team won the Intermediate C championship in 1974-75 and Ira Downer says game seven was quite an experience. "They had not lost a game at home all year and in the seventh game, we beat them in their own barn and we had a heck of a time getting out of town. They were throwing pop cans, beer cans at us the whole bit."

The key to the winning was hard work say the former players. "We just sort of gelled together like a bowl

full of jelly," says Wilf Keating. "We worked hard and had a lot of fun."

"If there 50 people here that was a good night," says Blackmore.

The first year of Senior A play, they broke all kinds of records. And in 1979, the Squires beat Steinbeck to win the Allan Cup. "CKCO Television televised our games and we sold out every game," says Downer. They repeated against St. Boniface in 1981.

It was quite a feat for amateur players from small town Ontario, he adds. "It was an unbelievable feeling...Petrolia is one of the smallest towns to win the Allan Cup."
