WHY DO YOU EXPECT **CORRUPTION?**

A mother calls us to say her child has come home from school with tales of other students being whisked away by ambulance after overdosing on drugs.

A former tradesman, closing in on 60, back broken twice and with a second mortgage on his home to pay for the prescription opioids he relies on to get through his day calls us to say he has been arrested in the midst of a medical crisis. He is most upset, he says, because police threatened to shoot his dog. He can't afford a lawyer.

One caller told us they couldn't stand up against the mistreatment they felt they were receiving from a municipality because they were going to need a building permit in a couple months.

What do these stories have in common? We can't tell them.

None of these callers would go on the record. They were irate, but at the same time paralyzed by fear of the people elected or appointed to serve the public.

When regular citizens come up against authority or the juggernaut of massive power systems like justice, education or politics, they too often cower before their public servants.

In each case, the caller believed it was reasonable to expect corruption.

Is blind obedience hammered into us in school so fully that we never get over it? Do we never grow up and understand teachers, principals and school board trustees work for us?

Is the military might of the police force so intimidating we fear holding them to account when they've used the weapons we gave them to bully us?

Has cynicism about the people who get into politics tainted our opinion of our neighbours at the council table so much that we think they will use whatever power they have against us?

We know local mayors, police officers, principals and bureaucrats that got into public service with the best of intentions, and who continue to give their all for their community. If there is corruption, it's the exception not

So we put it to everyone in power to take action to earn the trust of the citizen.

A good first step would be a serious commitment to transparency. Too often you try to manage the message when we do call with questions based on what the community wants or needs to know. Information gatekeepers give the public PR spin when organizations should be admitting mistakes and taking responsibility.
