

Mariane Santo braces herself whenever she hears fireworks being illegally set off around her Milton neighbourhood at night, as loud booms and fizzles fill the streets.

Her 11-year-old son, who as attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), can't fall asleep when the startling explosions start.

"Sometimes it's days of it," she said in an email interview, painting an unpleasant picture of the effects that also trigger anxiety in

the family's standard poodle.

"My dog is pacing the house panting, shaking, and hiding behind or under stuff, or he's attached to my side scared out of his mind, and he is a (75-pound) dog. And this all happens even when he's medicated."

The veterinary technician

WORKPLACE COVID-19 VACCINE POLICIES NEEDED: MOH



With the COVID-19 Delta variant continuing to spread, the region's top doctor is calling on local employers to put workplace vaccine rules in place to protect staff and the public.

Halton Medical Officer of Health Dr. Hamidah Meghani announced her latest advice Aug. 26, when she issued a guidance document for businesses that also includes suggested provisions for workers who decline vaccinations for medical or other reasons protected by Ontario's Human Rights Code.

"We are facing a critical time in our combined efforts against COVID-19 in Ontario," she said. "The rapid and continuing spread of the Delta variant of concern — with increased transmissibility and disease severity —

COMMUNITY RALLIES AROUND FAMILY AFTER BOY DROWNS

The community has come together in support of a Milton family following the tragic loss of an 11-year-old boy who drowned in a storm water management pond after falling through the ice.

A mother whose son survived the Dec. 19 incident at the Tremaine and Derry roads pond has started a GoFundMe page that has already raised thousands of dollars for the child's family.

Ayse Ucgec said on her Go-FundMe page that on the afternoon of Dec. 19 her son and his close friend, who she identifies only as Ayuub, were playing in the area of Reece Court where they decided to venture out onto the ice of a storm water management pond, believing it was thick enough to play on.

"When his friend fell through the ice, he jumped in to try to save
