Changes coming as Wolves lose pair of weekend games

Eganville-- The *Valley Timberwolves* saw an early two-goal lead and a one-goal third period lead vanish as they dropped a tough 5-4 overtime loss to the *Athens Aeros* Sunday night at the Eganville Arena.

The team jumped out to the 2-0 lead on goals by Dylan Kuehl and Jack Shulist before the game was seven minutes old. Matt Goudreault and Alex Fleming assisted on Kuehl's tally at 4:52 while Ethan Biggs and Jack Peplinski were credited with helpers on Shulist's tally. The *Aeros* answered later in the frame as Brett Johnston and Tye Carswell got pucks by *Timberwolves'* goalie Andrew Cristea to knot the score at two.

Athens jumped into the lead 55 seconds into period two with Jayden Boyer finding the twine. The *Timberwolves* responded 1:05 later as Goudreault scored with Jamiee Sutherland drawing the assist to tie the score.

Leo Kluchert put the home team up 4-3 midway through the period with Fleming and Sam Klawitter assisting on the go-ahead goal. With 3:02 remaining in the second period, Johnston recorded his second goal of the game for Athens to knot the score at four. There was no scoring in the third, so the teams went to a 3-on-3 overtime, with Ty Nicholson scoring the unassisted game-winner 2:25 into the extra frame. Emerson Hunt of Athens stopped 18 of 22 shots to post the win while Cristea turned aside 36 of the 41 shots he faced.

There were seven penalties called in the contest, four to Athens and three to the *Timberwolves*.

Timberwolves head coach Gord Goldberg said the team played well but mistakes in the defensive zone cost them the game.

"That kept Athens in the game and eventually led to the overtime loss," he stated. "There's still lots of work to do and lots of practice needed to fix our defensive zone play."

"Fans may soon see us make some more transactions this week to help the situation," he added.

He was asked if he saw any positives from the two weekend encounters. "We played very physical Sunday and we can play with teams when the guys follow the game plan," he responded. "Needless to say, that is why we are changing some personnel because we want players who follow our game plan."

The *Timberwolves* suffered their worst defeat of the year Saturday night, an 8-2 loss to the *Canadians* in a road game in Carleton Place. The host team put up a 2-0 lead through the opening period on goals by Ethan Wallace and Connor Dickey. Dickey added his second of the game 3:55 into the second, but Dylan Kuehl of the *Timberwolves* got his team on the board at the 11:26 mark to narrow the gap to 3-1. Brayden Stewart and Alex Fleming had the assists.

William Bouwer restored Carleton Place's three-goal lead before the period ended.

Tyler Cutts made the count 4-2 early in the second with Kuehl and

Matt Goudreault drawing the helpers. Then the floodgates opened and the *Canadians* scored four more for a final 8-2 score. Adam Edgerton, Hunter Neil, Alex McGlade had tallies for the home team and Dickey completed his hat-trick with the final goal of the game.

Jackson Pundyk turned away 23 of 25 shots in the win while *Timberwolves* goalie Tyson Johnston rejected 31 of the 39 shots that came his way. Carleton Place had nine of the 15 penalties called.

"We played two good periods and then let the game get away from us in the third," Goldberg noted of the Saturday contest. "It came down to inconsistent play and defensive zone mistakes too."

This Saturday, the *Timberwolves* are in Athens for a rematch with the *Aeros* at 8:20 p.m. and on Sunday they host the tough *Perth Blue Wings* in Eganville at 6 p.m. With the Sunday game being on Hallowe'en night, the *Timberwolves* will have candy at the arena door for children who want to stop in.

Whitewater Win Twice

In other league action, the Cobden-based *Whitewater Kings* won both their games over the weekend to vault from eighth place to fifth. On Friday night, they defeated the *Westport Rideaus* 2-1 and on Saturday night, the team skated to a 5-4 win over the *Arnprior Packers*. This weekend, they welcome *Westport* to Cobden on Saturday at 8 p.m. and on Hallowe'en they have a 3:30 matinee in Athens.

Eganville -- The puck dropped to open the 2021/22 Eganville Hockey League (EHL) schedule Friday with Calver Lumber and the M.W. Miler Loggers posting wins in their respective games.

Whitewater foiled Matt Schroeder's shut-out bid with 2:40 to go in the game as Nick Olmstead directed a puck towards the net that appeared to be re-directed off a Calver player past Schroeder to make the count 8-1.

There were three penalties handed out, two to Calver and one to *Whitewater*.

The nightcap between the Loggers and the Bulls was a much closer contest with the Loggers squeaking out a 4-3 win.

The lone goal of the third by the Loggers proved to be the game-winner with Moss burying a Borutski feed to complete a perfect 2-on-1 rush. Both goalies made big saves in the third to keep the game close for their respective teams.

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Vaccine mandate concerns continue at Eganville Arena

Eganville – The introduction of the new COVID-19 mandatory vaccine mandate did not go in smoothly at the Eganville Arena with staff resorting to calling the Ontario Provincial Police to intervene, and concerns continue about the policy prohibiting children from being active.

“This policy goes exactly against that, where I want to see -- and I assume all my colleagues agree -- where we want to see more stuff going on at the arena. We want to see more kids out and active and doing different hobbies and this really limits us with some of these kids,” Bonnechere Mayor Jennifer Murphy said last Tuesday at Bonnechere Valley council.

Users of the arena, as well as volunteers and coaches, must show proof of vaccination, council was told. This did not go over well at first with some families and police were called in early on.

“They were called mostly to educate to say this is being passed down by the province and it was just information,” Kevin McGrath, recreation manager for Bonnechere Valley, told council.

“I think that is a very important message, that this is not a protocol that we put in place,” Mayor Murphy replied. “When you say it is the RCDHU it changes quite a bit.”

In his report, Mr. McGrath said OPP were called “to deal with not complying to the regulation and protocols.”

The health unit has been changing the date several times on vaccine information being mandatory and extending the deadline, he added.

“As of November 30th, the Renfrew County Health Unit states it is mandatory for people over 12 years old to be vaccinated,” he said.

Councillor Jack Roesner asked what impact this is having on people who participate in activities at the arena.

“I think there is going to be some impact,” Mr. McGrath said. “To what degree it is hard to say.”

Councillor Tim Schison said there is an impact because the OPP were called to deal with issues.

“Right at the beginning when it was first mandated to show vaccinations coming at the door we had a few situations,” Mr. McGrath said. “So, we did all we could do.”

Calling the OPP was to have another voice to explain the regulations, he said. Coun. Roesner said he would like

Mr. McGrath to compile information to give council a feeling on the impact of the vaccine mandate.

“I know I’ve received calls from people who are not happy, who are pulling their kids out (of sports at the arena),” he said. “Some are going to the effect of ‘why should we pay taxes for an arena we can’t use?’”

Knowing how many people are using the arena now and how many in the future would help, he said.

“The best way would be to ask minor hockey what their registration was and where we are today,” Mr. McGrath said. “That would give us an idea.”

Councillor Brent Patrick said the deadline of November 30 is for coaches and volunteers. He questioned how teams would be impacted. “Maybe there won’t be a coach for them or not,” he said.

There are kids who have been out of sports for some time now, he added.

“Obviously it is something we have limited control over. Just because it is passed down to us we have to administer it because we provide the service,” he said. “We don’t want kids to be impacted.”

“I want to make sure our outdoor rink is going to be amazing if they can’t play hockey,” he added.

Coun. Schison said he did not like to see the segregation taking place because of vaccination status.

“With kids and the families having to choose between this vaccination or enjoying, you know, something they have done for ever,” he said. “There’s been cases coming up where there have been young people taking the vaccine and they have had very bad side effects.”

“I don’t want to be a part of any council that has to push this stuff on our kids,” he said.

Vaccination information has changed, he pointed out. AstraZeneca was first seen as the best vaccine and it was pulled. Now Moderna is being pulled for people under 30 in many countries.

“I still believe we should be in a pro-freedom society,” he said.

Children should not be experimented on, Coun. Schison said.

Mayor Murphy said she is being asked for more youth programs and there is the idea of using the Eagles Nest.

“Is there a gymnastics instructor? Is there ballet?” she said. “If there is anything we can do to get these kids off the couch and into a healthy way of living? And I would include

myself in that.”

However, the vaccination policy may mean not all kids can participate, she said.

Coun. Schison said if the vaccination did stop infection or contagion he would feel differently. However, people who are vaccinated can still catch COVID and pass it on, he said.

“Until someone can show me the positives of public safety by having it rather than just trying to prevent our hospitals from being overwhelmed, they are going to have to do a little better job of showing me that,” he said.

There are people who are sick even though they are vaccinated and others have had adverse reactions to the vaccine.

“I’m not going to shove this to our kids,” he said. “I’m sorry, I’m not going to take any part of it.”

Mayor Murphy said it has been almost two years and people are frustrated.

“We do need our physical and mental health to get better, especially for the kids, and we are in this situation,” she said.

There needs to be programming for kids in the community, she stressed.

Coun. Patrick pointed out volunteers are hard to find and this policy may impact volunteers. He said having outdoor activities for children will be crucial.

Councillor Merv Buckwald asked if the policy applies to minor hockey or just the upper-level hockey. He was told it was all levels of hockey.

Coun. Patrick asked if someone rents the ice surface, do they have to show the children are vaccinated.

“Yes, if they are over the age of 12,” Mr. McGrath said. “They will be required to show vaccination.”

“Even in a private rental?” asked Coun. Patrick.

“Yes, if they are coming into our facility,” replied Mr. McGrath.

In his report to council, he noted there has been good attendance at Junior B hockey games so far this year. There were 106 people at the opening game and now there are between 80 and 90 at each game.

“Going back to masking, there are a lot of people coming through that door and they have a lot in their hands and it has gone seamless,” he said. “It is a learning curve for everybody but it has worked.”

“We may get some pushback but there is good too,” he said.

Public skating is starting on November 7, he said.

Eganville -- The *Valley Timberwolves* collected their second win of the season Sunday night with Andrew Cristea posting the shut-out in the team's 2-0 victory over the visiting *Whitewater Kings* in front of 100 fans at the Eganville Community Centre.

Cristea turned aside all 26 shots he faced to post the shut-out while teammates Sam Klawitter and Alexander Fleming found the twine behind *Kings'* goalie Anthony Santaguida to give the team the win.

Both goalies held their opponents off the scoreboard for much of the opening period, with Klawitter finally breaking the scoreless draw at the 14:56 mark, firing a rebound home for the tally. Nicholas Cuddy and Andrew

Roaring game returns to Eganville Curling Club

Eganville – The friendly confines of the Eganville Curling Club (ECC) were alive again last week with the roar of granite stones heading from end to end and the shouts of "sweep, hurry hard."

The club launched its 2021/2022 season on November 1 with former and new members anxious to hit the ice after missing the final month of the 2019 season and the entire 2019/2020 season due to the COVID pandemic.

"The response of the members coming back has been very positive," remarked president Gerald Priestley. "We've been lamenting the time off. We hadn't thrown a rock in so long."

"Everyone's excited to be back and happy to be playing," he added.

He said the last games at the club had been played mid-March 2019, right after the Opeongo High School team won the Eastern Ontario Secondary School Athletics championship, which the ECC hosted.

Priestley admitted the pre-registrations were not what he expected after people having been couped up so long with COVID.

"It hasn't started with quite the bang I thought it would," he stated. "I thought there'd be a built-up interest of people wanting to get out of the cave post-Covid to come out and play."

"It hasn't quite happened to my hopes, but we have interest, yes, and contacts, and I'm thinking it's going to take us a while to grow the club to get back to where it was and to grow it larger."

"We had people come out for our open house and play, but the fall has always been a tough time in Eganville with hunting season, farming and various things going on," he added. "We don't always get the highest membership totals before Christmas."

Despite that fact, Priestley said the club is operating a full draw schedule with Monday night, Tuesday and Thursday morning leagues, Thursday mixed, and a Friday night drop-in league.

"Unfortunately, we don't have a youth program. We've been unable to attract any youths to play this year," he said.

The club currently has 45 members, down marginally from other years, but again, he expects that to increase in the new year.

Priestley credited ice technician Darrell Patriquin for the great job he has done since turning the plant on in mid-October, noting he had to battle the unseasonably mild temperatures in the process.

New Protocols

The ECC has adopted some of the protocols recommended by Curl Canada to allow the sport to resume safely.

"This whole COVID thing has been very difficult on everybody, as individuals, organizations, as community groups, government, so the executive decided to take a prudent approach this year and exercise due diligence and decided to operate under the Curl Canada guidelines. Having said that, you have to appreciate what Curl Canada suggests you do as a curling club. They're referring to northern Saskatchewan, Summerside, P.E.I. or Eganville."

"So, I am aware having polled local clubs they are not all doing that this year," he added. "Deep River is and I know we are. I don't think Pembroke or Renfrew are."

Priestley re-iterated the executive felt it was better to ease back into things and show due diligence, so they implemented the Curl Canada recommendations. The biggest change in play is the fact there can only be one sweeper follow the rock down the ice and the skip or vice-skip in the house may not come forward to sweep an opponent's rock through or to assist sweeping a teammate's throw.

He said the one sweeper conforms with the recommended social distancing limiting two players sweeping side-by-side, giving it their all to get the rock down the ice. Masks are not required on the ice but are mandatory when entering the club and in the club room. Priestley said restaurant rules apply to allow people to remove their masks at the tables to enjoy a beverage or snack. They also request visitors to sign in for contact tracing.

"We may have to assess this at Christmas. We'll keep it touch with what Curl Canada recommendations are as well as monitor the situation as to what's happening in Renfrew County. We'll make that decision in the new year, whether to continue with these protocols or go back to full, regular curling."

He said the members found the new rules a little confusing at first and that it does disrupt the game but,

for the most part, people have been accepting of it because it is quite straightforward.

He said the executive has not scheduled any bonspiels but he is hopeful to have some in the new year.

"We're not doing any inter-club play here until the new year and then we'll see what happens at that time," he stated.

He noted a team from the ECC are the reigning 2019 Ottawa Valley Super League champions but that is not

operating this year, nor is the senior competition between rinks in Cobden, Shawville and Killaloe.

Priestley said the popular Escape Room is available for groups again, with the Al Capone theme, and anyone interested can contact him at 613-628-1836.

The club had received some grant money to make the building more accessible which will include an accessible ramp and washroom on the main floor.

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
