

Logan's love of sport seems boundless, and his sister is more than happy to abide his passion for play. Between the front door and the living where I found Logan, I counted five different basketball nets; some hanging from the walls, others lower on the ground and perfect for alley-oop dunks.

"They're pretty big basketball fans, as you can see," said Morgan Cooper, gesturing to all the nets. Fostering her son's enthusiasm for sport has always been important to Cooper, and she wanted to make sure that Logan's Down syndrome didn't create a barrier to entry that would keep him away from the thing he loves. So, she called up the woman who knows everything about that kind of thing.

Dori Schooley brought the Ontario Special Olympics program to Port Colborne about

four decades ago, and has been the local co-ordinator ever since. Last year she was inducted into the Port Colborne Sports Wall of Fame for her years of service to the Ontario Special Olympics program.

"When I spoke to (Schooley), she said she was looking to hand over the reins of the program, so I volunteered, and now here I am," said Cooper. "I really appreciate everything she has done over the years,

and I can't wait to keep things going."

GREEN LIGHT FOR RETAIL CANNABIS STORES IN PORT COLBORNE

Entrepreneurial green thumbs will be able to open a retail cannabis store in Port Colborne, after councillors voted 6-2 in favour of the opt into the provincial cannabis program. Legal cannabis is already being sold to Port Colborne residents through the province's online store, but opening a physical store within city limits is now also on the table.

By taking the opt-in, council secured an initial payment of \$13,000 and set itself up to score additional cannabis sale profits, which the provincial government says it will be sharing with municipalities, but, only those which opt-in to allowing retail cannabis stores to set up shop within their borders. Even with the opt-in, pot shops are unlikely to start springing up around Port Colborne any time soon, as provincewide retail store licenses have been limited to just 25, and only one has been allotted for all of Niagara. The first 25 licences are also required to go in a city with a population of at least 50,000, which disqualifies Port Colborne from the first round. With a cut of the profit, but no actual possibility of having to deal with a real cannabis store in the city, many councillors saw it as a win-win.

"So, there's no licence, and there's no applications in front of us to actually build one of these, but we still get the money," said Ward 3 Coun. Frank Danch. "That's good money for the taxpayers."

How much of those profits will be shared with Port Colborne is anyone's guess; as noted in a staff report about the issue, how much profit is being generated by the Ontario Cannabis Store is unknown, and the exact revenue sharing model is still in flux. But as many councillors noted, some money is better than no money.

"I think we're about two years

away from even seeing a (cannabis) store here anyway," said Ward 3 Coun. Gary Bruno, who also claimed to have spoken to an "undercover detective" who advised him to take the opt-in.

The two lone dissenting votes came from Ward 1 Coun. Donna Kalailieff and Ward 4 Coun. Harry Wells.

"I'm not sure we have all the accurate information we need to make a decision," said Kalailieff, who favoured taking the opt-out in the short term and assessing the situation down the line once other municipalities had dealt with the issue. The opt-out clause offered by the province is single-use, meaning the city could have taken the opt-out before the Jan. 22 deadline, and still been allowed to opt in later, but because Port Colborne has already taken the opt-in, it can never opt out again.

"This decision is going to be with us forever," said Kalailieff. "We should sit back for now."

Ward 2 Coun. Eric Beaure-

gard, the youngest member of council, was the most ardent supporter of taking the opt-in.

"This legislation has been created with the intent to combat the black market, which does exist in Port Colborne," said Beauregard. "This is going to be sold online, no matter what decision we make, so it's in the best interest of Port Colborne and the taxpayers to benefit from this, and the only way to do that is by opting in today."
