citizen group is com-ing together in a bid to save Jackson Pool. The six-member team has

been canvassing the business community with the goal of repairing the East Street swimming hole, which has been closed since 2015.

"I believe we can find a

sponsor," said co-organizer Daniel Harding, City staff told The Jour-

nal earlier this year Jackson requires at least \$167,000 for a major reconstruction and upgrade to meet today's building codes and accessibility requirements.
