Ranch sorting requires two riders to

move a herd of ten cattle in numerical order from a round pen to an adjoining pen within a 60 second time limit.

There is a 12-foot opening between the two pens and one rider will station themselves at the opening preventing unwanted cows from being herded out of numerical order.

Riders take turns herding cows into the adjoining pen.

If a cow crosses into the adjoining pen out of sequence, the team can be disqualified.

Team penning involves three riders and horses using athleticism and horsemanship to corral cows into a penning area in under 90 seconds.

As far as danger to the animals during an event like this, Peddie said, "penning is 90 seconds, sorting is done in 60 seconds. Cattle are switched out regularly to avoid heat exhaustion on the animals. The

judge also watches for any signs of stress or exhaustion and if there are problems the group is switched. The calves are in holding pens with water and hay. Our first priority is always the cattle."

Cougar Ridge Farms hosts both ranch sorting and team penning events over the summer months.

Next up on the calendar is Team Penning on Saturday, September 7, then ranch sorting on September 8.

Rosalie received a liver from a family in British Columbia.

"It really takes a village, thanks to family, friends, our employers, our community, all doctors and staff at all of the hospitals, but probably most of all to the family from B.C. for making the difficult decision to give Rosalie the gift of life," noted Livingston.

Add fruit. Instead of adding sugar, try adding fresh or dried fruits to your recipes.

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
