That's not all attendees learned. Discussions were also had around eating plants, weeds and roots from the natural environment and what plants are good for the human body.


John Dynes, one of the attendees, commented on how pharmaceuticals are a new addition to the health field and should not be used as frequently as they are. "One thing people forget is the main medical


